


## How to Make a Flannelgraph

A flannelgraph is a flannel-covered board with corresponding flannel pieces. It is a fun story-telling tool that is great for teaching. You will be amazed at how well the pieces stick to the board! Flannelgraphs work because of the fuzzy nap on both surfaces and the angle of the easel.




### Materials:

- Flannel (neutral color/pattern works best)
- Cardboard, Foamboard, etc.
- Glue
- Easel
- Scissors
- Printer Paper or Card Stock
- Computer Printer or Markers
- WAGGGS Template (optional)



### Directions:

1. Cover the board with flannel, fuzzy side out. Fold extra material around the back, and glue down. Do not use glue on the front. Set it on an easel when dry.
2. Print or draw your shapes and cut them out. Leave a border around the edge.
3. Lay more flannel material on a work surface, fuzzy side down, with the wrong-side up.
4. Cover the back of paper shapes with a thin layer of glue, from edge to edge. Place shapes, glue side down, onto the wrong-side of the flannel material. Let dry.
5. Cut the glued pieces out of the flannel, leaving a border around the shape.
6. Place the flannel-backed pieces on the flannel board.



If you make the flannelgraph for the WAGGGS ceremony, you can use this template. Just cut out the pieces and glue them to the flannel, following the steps above.
